Motion by Hass, seconded by Wohlleber and carried that the monthly bills had been audited for payment.

Supervisor Jacangelo opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance and opened the floor for comments.

Public Comment Period - B. Teal, Poestenkill Fire Chief reported on the information that was reported in the Times Union regarding our ambulance service which he himself felt was not factual. B. Teal went on to elaborate that Mohawk now covers the Poestenkill area and has been, since our ambulance was taken out of service. Poestenkill still has first responders that reports to the scene prior to Mohawk arriving and it seems to be working out well. D. Bader, Poestenkill resident feels that response time as it stands now is way too long and something needs to be done. Supervisor Jacangelo thanked B. Teal for clarifying statements reported in the Times Union. He went on to state that the first responders have done a great job. Supervisor Jacangelo stated that the first responders carry defibrillators which the Poestenkill Business Association helped fund. Rensselaer County Legislator, R. Bayly reported that he had spoken with a Mohawk Ambulance representative and they were going to put together a figure for a dedicated ambulance for this area and that the representative stated that he would get back to Mr. Bayly. Councilman Van Slyke praised the first responders and stated it was not his intention for people to think that he was criticizing their work. Councilman Wohlleber stated that the ambulance committee report is 97% completed and will be delivered to the Supervisor shortly.

Mr. Thielemann and Robert Recio wanted to address the Town Board regarding their issues of the use of their property on 647 Blue Factory Rd., and the letters that have been sent from the Code Enforcement Officer. Mr. Recio stated that he feels that they are personally being attacked because of their neighbor. R. Brunet had sent a letter dated May 5th to Mr. Thielmann along with a Stop Work Order. This issue has been ongoing for several years with Mr. Thielemann and Mr. Recio living in the camping trailer on the property with no running water or a septic system. There is no current building permit for the construction of the house because it has expired. Yet Mr. Thielemann and his (roommate) continue to live in the camping trailer in violation of the Town Code. Mr. Thielemann would just like to be left alone and feels that his constitutional rights are being fringed upon. He feels that there is a misinterpretation of the law. He wants to live in the camping trailer until his home is fully constructed but has no idea how long this might take. Right now money is an issue. Town Attorney Tomaselli stated that his understanding is the activities are alleged code violations and if there is no cure, the matter will be brought to court.

Youth Advisory Board-Town Board member Wohlleber reported that the Youth Board met on May 18th and they are working on a Field Day to be held on June 24th at the VFW.

Planning Board Memo dated 4/21/16 on Fee Schedule-Any formal action on the fee schedule additions will be held over until the June Town Board meeting so Town Board members can thoroughly review the Planning Board memo.

Correspondence:

Memo dated May 4th from Time Warner Cable stating that certain services/stations might be discontinued in the near future.

Action Items:

Warren Fane-SEQRA Review-Town Board members had received amended documents to the rezoning project located Snyders Corners Road. Several members did take a personal tour of the mine. Parts 2 and 3 of the Full Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) have to be completed by the Town Board (Part 1 was completed by the applicant) and based on the results of the complete EAF, the Town Board has to make a determination as to significance. Town Board members answered all of the questions in Parts 2 and 3 of the Full EAF and it was entered into the record and became a part of the file. This form was lengthy and Town Board members did have much discussion over some of the resident issues. Motion by Van Slyke, seconded by Butler to issue a Negative Declaration on this rezoning project. There was some discussion among Town Board members and the impacts and Supervisor Jacangelo feels that the impacts can be mitigated in the context of the final Local Law that addresses the rezoning.


The Town of Poestenkill fully supports the Agricultural Stewardship Association's (ASA) Farmland Protection Implementation Grant proposal to the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets for a perpetual conservation easement on the Wagner Farm, a dairy operation which is owned by Wagner Farm Properties LLC. The farmland protection project involves a 293-acre property that straddles the Brunswick/Poestenkill town line.

A portion of the project property is located within the Town of Poestenkill, which has adopted a Right to Farm Life Law in 1988. The Town of Poestenkill also adopted a Comprehensive Plan in 2006, which states "The Town will support development of programs that encourage sustainable owner operator farming in the town" and "Encourage to work with the Rensselaer County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board, ... and similar organizations in exploring techniques for preservation of farm land, open spaces, ..., e.g., purchasing development rights for farming, exploring land trust options, ..." This project was discussed at the May 19, 2016 meeting of the Town Board which expressed their unanimous support for the project.

We are delighted to partner with ASA and the Town of Brunswick and show our support for the protection of the Wagner Farm. If the project is awarded state funding, we understand that ASA, as the grant applicant, will be responsible for administering the grant, and holding and enforcing the conservation easement.

We urge the Department to give favorable consideration for this worthy application.

Mr. and Mrs. Yetto presented their application that they would like to split their property and give their son a piece of land to construct his home. It is apparent that they do not have the setbacks to meet the requirements of the town code. Their front yard setback is 31.9 feet. Code requires 50 feet. Their rear yard setback is 28.1 feet. Code also requires 50 feet. Also the minimum lot size according to code is one acre. The Yetto's are asking for a .44 acre sub-divide.

There was a lengthy discussion between the Board and the public. Kathleen Ryan daughter of Joanne Ryan, 8 Weatherwax Road and David Anderson, 10 Weatherwax Road strongly oppose to the Yetto's application to build a house on the lot for many reasons. The neighbors spoke about the size of the property, where the leach field is located. They were also interested in getting deeds, maps, surveys and other material together and hold the hearing open until such information can be collected.

The Board makes a decision to keep the hearing open until June 14, 2016. At which time the neighbors can bring in any information that they have collected about the property.

SUBJECT: Change in procedure for collecting application reimbursable expenses

I would like to recommend a change in the current procedure for collecting the reimbursable expenses for Planning Board applications. Currently the applicant pays the application fee at the time of application submission. Reimbursable expenses for mailings and public hearing notices are unknown at this time and are not billed until the application process is nearly completed. Sometimes the billing is not done until after the application has been voted on. In the past this has resulted in some expenses never being paid or in repeated attempts having to be made to recover the expenses.

In an effort to streamline the process I am suggesting that the application fee and reimbursable expenses be combined and charged to the applicant in the beginning. This process has the advantage of ensuring that the applicants are aware of the full cost of their application from the beginning. It also eliminates the need for the Clerk of the Planning Board to repeatedly bill applicants for outstanding expenses.

In determining how to bill for expenses that vary from application to application, several recent applications were reviewed and the average expenses determined. The breakdown of this follows.

Minor Subdivision	Fee plus mailing (\$5) plus public hearing notice (\$55) 1 st new lot = \$160. additional lots = \$200 per lot
Major Subdivision	Remains as is; escrow account for expenses and notification fees
Site Plan Review (no SUP)	\$50 fee plus certified mailing (\$50) plus public hearing notice (\$55) Fee plus notification fee = \$155
Special Use Permit	Fee (varies) plus certified mailing (\$50) plus public hearing notice (\$55) Fee plus notification fee = Fee plus \$105 notification fee
Lot Line Adjustment	Remains as is; no mailing or public hearing notice

Note: The reference to reimbursable expenses should remain on the application to cover expert and/or engineering expenses that may still accrue.

Dear Supervisor Jacangelo:

National Grid is interested in bringing gas to the Town of Poestenkill if we can make the economics work within our Tariff.

We need approximately 200 customers to commit to heat their homes and commercial buildings . We currently have slightly less than 150 who have signed up to connect to gas if and when it is brought to Poestenkill.

When we have a project that falls outside of our tariff requirements we must charge the customers involved to start the project. The short fall for the Poestenkill project is about \$250,000-\$300,000. This represents about 50 customers at \$5000+/- per customer.

As we have discussed, we know that once construction on the initial gas main starts more customers will sign up and connect to natural gas.

If the Town would pay National Grid the \$300,000 to start the project National Grid would repay the Town for any and all customers over the existing 150 sign ups for the first five years after the project is completed. Each time a new customer connects you would receive the refund only up to the amount of your prepayment.

We are confident that installing the gas main will attract more than 50 additional customers and additional new development along the pipeline.

If the Town is interested in moving forward let me know and we will arrange for the exact details to be presented to you.

Thank you and Dave Hass for all of your efforts to bring natural gas to your town.



ASSESSOR'S REPORT FOR MAY 2016


During the month of May this office is open specific times for grievance in addition to regular hours. We had a few inquiries and a few clerical corrections with two grievance applications filed and reviewed by the Board of Assessment Review on May 26th. These changes/corrections are then forwarded to the county for correction to the final roll which is printed by July 1st. Notices of Determination are sent to the respective owners of these changes so that they are aware of the results. These changes are on the final roll and show first on their school bills this September.

As a follow up regarding the way new owners file for their STAR exemption, the State website was finally available by mid to late May for those new owners who need to register by July 1st. We had several calls from owners who were notified by mail from the county that they need to register even though they had already filed here on time. They were concerned because their names were not listed when they went to file. After several conversations with our county office, who also had to call the State for an explanation as to what was transpiring and why it was so difficult for owners to register, (the State had not conveyed enough information for this website for both of us to be informed timely) it appears that the new owners need to answer several more questions and give more information in order to do the final registering. Wait time as well has fluctuated quite a bit with sometimes being over an hour in order to finalize this online. If the person registers by July 1st, they are supposed to receive their check in time to pay their school bills. If they register after July 1st, the wait time for checks is longer and there is no guarantee they will receive their check by September.

New deeds continue to be processed as well with new owners recorded and processed on the property record cards and the rps system.

Constituent relations are considered good during the report period.

New construction permits and permit renewals have increased during the May period. Repair and alterations work has continued, largely on existing open permits. In this month's report the standard results are reviewed and a detailed summary of our status of connections to the Poestenkill municipal water system is presented. A brief overview of our water hookup status is as follows: (6/9/2016).

- 1) Permits issued to hookup – 372
- 2) Final testing, water flushing, meter installation and plumbing connection inspections (fully hooked-up residences/businesses/schools to water)–354
- 3) Certificates of Compliance issued – 330
- 4) Physical site inspections for hookup – 660
- 5) New Installations (2)

On May 2, 2016 we took the NYSDOH required sample for the monthly Coliform test. The Coliform sample was tested by St. Peter's Hospital Environmental Laboratory and found to be satisfactory. The quarterly THM tests were also taken and we are awaiting the test results.

The overview of our standard items reveals that resident complaints, inspections for construction and property maintenance issues are continuing with corrective actions being taken where warranted, most on a voluntary compliance basis.

There is continued action required to address those locations where the owner either ignores or refuses to correct the problems. An ongoing case in point is the location of 647 Blue Factory Rd, Averill Park where the owner (who attended the last Town Board meeting accompanied by three of his associates) continues to violate numerous Town Codes involving an excessive number of dogs, illegally living in a mobile home for an extended period of time. Other violations are likely to be cited. In spite of many residence complaints, in spite of numerous written complaints, in spite of numerous face to face meetings with the owner, and in spite of numerous phone calls, the owners' commitments to the Town and to the

complainant have not been kept; the owner continues, to this day to intentionally violate the Codes. The paperwork for court action is with Mr. Pat Tomaselli for review and will then be filed with the court for a Court Appearance date.

We continue to meet our objective of 100% compliance with regard to the NYS "811-Call Before You Dig" law. We have met 100% of our responsibilities as the Assessor's Data Collector, in time for the annual assessment update.

Dear Poestenkill Water District Resident,

The Town of Poestenkill has been notified by the Rensselaer County Health Department that sampling in the water district indicates that we have exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) based on a locational running annual average for **Total Trihalomethanes** per the levels established by the Environmental Protection Agency and the New York State Sanitary Code. The Maximum level of this substance as outlined in Part 5 of the New York Sanitary Code is **80 parts per billion**. Subpart 5-1.78 of the New York Sanitary Code requires that Poestenkill provide public notification (Tier 2) to all customers in the Poestenkill Water District #1. A copy of the public notification language was provided for the Town's use by the Rensselaer County Department of Health (as stated on page 2 of this letter). For the 1st quarter of 2016 the locational running annual average at one of the two required sampling locations was 81.8 PPB based upon the 2/16/2016 testing. At the second required location the test result was 70.5 PPB, significantly lower than the required limit of 80 PPB. These results are significantly improved from past results, achieved as the result of Troy's efforts. Additionally, our 5/2/2016 test results were 57.9 PPB and 53.7 PPB respectively. However, because of the running annual average measurement requirement, you have received similar letters in the past. At this point (as will be discussed later) the THM problem is not yet fully resolved but very significant progress has been made; the solution rests predominately with the cities of Troy and Brunswick. Trihalomethanes are a byproduct of the chlorine used to disinfect our drinking water supply. The City of Troy adds chlorine at their water treatment facility. Brunswick also adds chlorine to the water. In addition, the Town of Poestenkill adds chlorine at the Pump Station on Spring Avenue Extension. It should be mentioned here that our monthly chlorine residual test results (From ST. PETER'S HOSPITAL ENVIRONMENTAL LABORATORY) have continually met safe standards. It also should be mentioned that Poestenkill does not treat our water for THMs. As a matter of fact, with the high level of THMs in the water which we receive from Troy and which is pumped through Brunswick, it is virtually impossible to meet the existing THM requirements without specialized water treatment in Poestenkill; we are dependent upon Troy and Brunswick to reduce the THMs in the water which they provide us. There is no action needed by homeowners. The Town of Poestenkill has been and will continue to be working with the City of Troy Water Department, the New York State Health Department, and the Rensselaer County Health Department to reduce trihalomethanes while maintaining chlorine levels that will ensure that your drinking water is safe.

The Rensselaer County Department of Health required wording is contained in the following two paragraphs.

What are trihalomethanes?

Trihalomethanes are a group of chemicals that are formed in drinking water during disinfection when chlorine reacts with naturally occurring organic material (e.g., decomposing vegetation such as tree leaves, algae or other aquatic plants) in surface water sources such as rivers and lakes. They are disinfection byproducts and include the individual chemicals chloroform, bromoform, bromodichloromethane, and chlorodibromomethane. The amount of trihalomethanes formed in drinking water during disinfection can change from day to day, depending on the temperature, the amount of organic material in the water, the amount of chlorine added, and a variety of other factors.

Disinfection of drinking water by chlorination is beneficial to public health. Drinking water is disinfected by public water suppliers to kill bacteria and viruses that could cause serious illnesses, and chlorine is the most commonly used disinfectant in New York State. All public water systems that use chlorine as a disinfectant contain trihalomethanes to some degree.

What are the health effects of trihalomethanes?

Some studies suggest that people who drink chlorinated water containing trihalomethanes for long periods of time (20 to 30 years) have an increased risk for certain health effects. These include an increased risk for cancer and for low birth weights, miscarriages and birth defects. The methods used by these studies could not rule out the role of other factors that could have resulted in the observed increased risks. In addition, other similar studies do not show an increased risk for these health effects. Therefore, the evidence from these studies is not strong enough to conclude that trihalomethanes were a major factor contributing to the observed increased risks for these health effects. Studies of laboratory animals show that some trihalomethanes can cause cancer and adverse reproductive and developmental effects, but at exposures much higher than exposures that could result through normal use of water. The United States Environmental Protection Agency reviewed the information from the human and animal studies and concluded that while there is no casual link between disinfection byproducts (including trihalomethanes) and human health effects, the balance of the information warranted stronger regulations that limit the amount of trihalomethanes in drinking water, while still allowing for adequate disinfection. The risks for adverse health effects from trihalomethanes in drinking water are small compared to the risks for illness from drinking inadequately disinfected water.

WHERE DOES OUR WATER COME FROM?

In general, the sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals, vegetation or from

human activities. Contaminants that may be present in source water include: microbial contaminants; inorganic contaminants; pesticides and herbicides; organic chemical contaminants; and radioactive contaminants. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the State and the EPA prescribe regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The State Health Department's and the FDA's regulations also establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

The Town of Poestenkill purchases its water from the City of Troy, which is then pumped from Troy to Poestenkill, through Brunswick. The City of Troy draws its water from a "Surface Water Supply", the spring fed Tomhannock Reservoir. It is located northeast of the City of Troy. Water flows from the Reservoir to the Troy Water Treatment Plant (TWTP), a complete treatment facility. In an effort to lower the formation of disinfection byproducts (DBBPs), TWTP has started to add potassium permanganate at the Tomhannock Reservoir. Potassium permanganate is a strong oxidant that is used to oxidize the iron and manganese, but does not produce the DBBP's that chlorine does. Potassium permanganate is being fed seasonally from about June to about October depending on the iron and manganese levels in the Raw Water. Additionally chlorine dioxide is added to oxidize the organic material that leads to the formation of disinfection byproducts when it reacts with chlorine, chlorine dioxide does not form DBBP's like THM's or HAA5's. Chlorine dioxide is fed year-round. They also add fluoride at a low level to protect teeth against dental cavities.

Our water system serves approximately 360 service connections with approximately 700 people using water daily. The water is chlorinated as it enters the town prior to distribution; this is the only treatment which Poestenkill employs.

ARE THERE CONTAMINANTS IN OUR DRINKING WATER?

As the State regulations require, we routinely test your drinking water for numerous contaminants. These contaminants include: total coliform, turbidity, inorganic compounds, nitrate, nitrite, lead and copper, volatile organic compounds, total trihalomethanes, haloacetic acids, radiological and synthetic organic compounds. The only contaminant exceeding requirements is THMs; Poestenkill has continually met all other contaminant requirements. The State allows us to test for some contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently.

It should further be noted that all drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791) or the Rensselaer County Health Department at (518)270-2632, Mr. Rich Elder.


As discussed in previous letters to the Poestenkill water users, meeting this standard is beyond the control of Poestenkill and improvement depends largely on Troy. There have been ongoing meetings with Troy, New York State Department of Health, Rensselaer County Department of Health, Brunswick and Poestenkill. Troy has been taking significant steps to reduce

the Total Trihalomethanes; however, since the standard is based upon a twelve month moving average of quarterly results, we can expect to exceed the standard for some time. As a result of the efforts led by Troy, our THM level has significantly improved, but, again, due to the annual running average (the nature of the measurement) it will be some time before Poestenkill meets the standard. Furthermore, in addition to the work done by Troy, Brunswick and Poestenkill, it is possible that Poestenkill will be required to perform additional treatment to our water. We are proud to report that our system did not violate a maximum contaminant level of any other water quality standard.

Please share this information with all the other people who drink this water, especially those who may not have received this notice directly (for example, people in apartments, nursing homes, schools, and businesses). You can do this by posting this notice in a public place or distributing copies by hand or mail.

We will continue to work to solve the THM problem and will update you regarding any actions that the Town takes. If you have questions you may also contact the Town of Poestenkill Water Department at 283-5100 extension 102.
